Covid 19 Restrictions

The current advice from the Department, puts limitations on some of our regular activities and schedules. Some activities, such as singing, we are permitted to do, but others we are not, such as having parents and visitors at school assemblies and not having any adults who are not on essential school business on site. We are not able to have any transition visits for either kinder or secondary students, and school photos are not able to take place at this stage. All incursions and excursions that we had planned and scheduled, have had to be re-scheduled until later in the year, where possible, or until further advised. Any deposits or monies paid for incursions or excursions will be held until that event is rescheduled. Likewise our school photographers have assured us that all online orders placed so far, will be honoured.

Bus Services

I will be attending a CEP (Country Education Project) meeting which is looking into the bus services for rural students. Recent local events mean this will be a very timely and important project and review to be involved with.

Tutor Program Progress

Our funded Tutoring Program is well underway, with Allison Whitney, working with small groups or individuals, on two days a week. The number of students involved, means that most students will have 3 – 4 sessions with Allison, per week. The data so far, indicates that all students are making progress in the crucial areas of literacy, with phonological awareness, phonics, reading comprehension, being key areas of focus.

Critically important however, is that families follow up this work, at home. Research is abundantly clear on the importance of support and follow up at home, if children are to reach their potential.

The Shire of Campaspe is advertising for a School Crossing Supervisor for our school crossing. It will be on the Shire of Campaspe website on Friday.

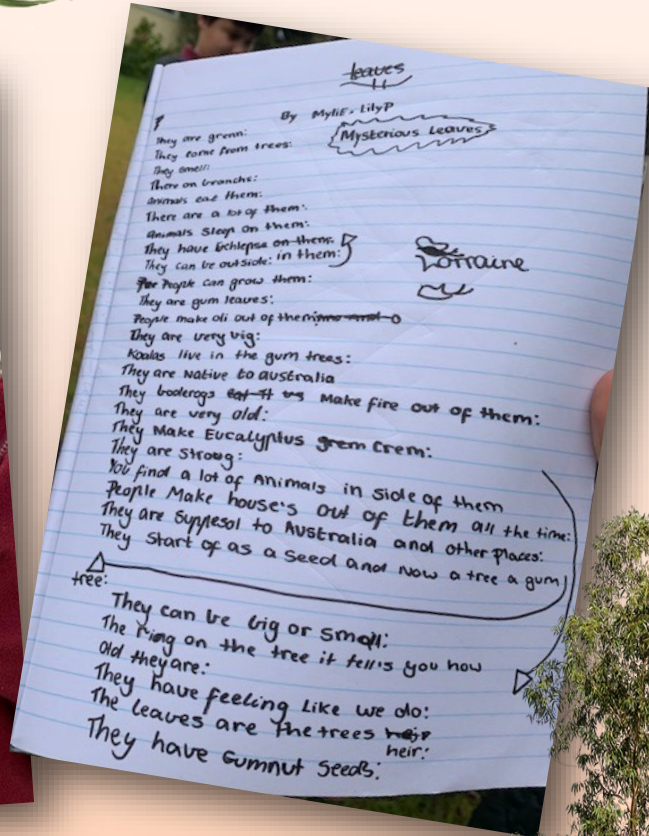

Jackets or coats are particularly useful if we have some light, intermittent showers or rain at recess times.

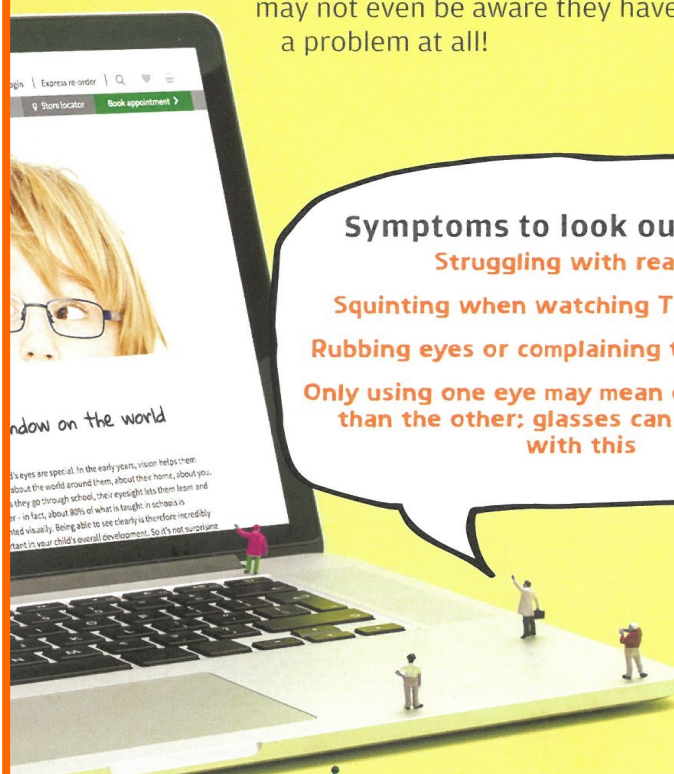
Hoodies are a safety issue if they get caught on a piece of equipment or if another student grabs hold of the hood, so these should not be worn at school. **All items need to be named clearly.**

After eight is too late

Each and every part of a child is special and that includes their eyes. Most eye conditions detected before the age of eight can be fixed, which is why we recommend that children have their first eye health check by the age of three.

Most children have their eyesight assessed as part of their routine developmental checks, and while these are very important, they aren't as thorough as a complete eye health check by an optometrist.

Children often find it difficult to explain their eyesight problems and sometimes may not even be aware they have a problem at all!



Symptoms to look out for in kids

Struggling with reading

Squinting when watching TV or reading

Rubbing eyes or complaining their eyes hurt

Only using one eye may mean one is stronger than the other; glasses can usually help with this
